For North Central Electric, 2021 started much the same as 2020 ended. Employees were working from home, there was increased pressure and concern on keeping everyone healthy as variants of COVID-19 began appearing, and we still needed to maintain the best possible service for our members each day.

Just like in the 1930s, the co-op embraced these challenges and came out stronger for it. We saw an increase in members willing to try things like SmartHub to pay their bills electronically and tuning in for virtual annual meetings while employees continued to devise new ways for communicating and working together, even from separate locations. All these changes, and more, are working.

NCE once again received high marks regarding member satisfaction, earning an American Customer Satisfaction Index score of 88 out of 100. We remained in line with other Ohio electric cooperatives and much higher than investor-owned and municipality scores.

As a not-for-profit electric cooperative, we were also able to give back over \$1 million to current and past members in capital credits in 2021.

You received these credits because you're an owner of the cooperative. It's the most unique and rewarding part of being a co-op member.

One statistic we were pleased to see decrease in 2021 was our number of outages, which dropped to 173, with an average outage length of only 42 minutes. Our operations

department and line crews remain dedicated to updating equipment and focusing on preventive measures like line maintenance and right-of-way clearing to reduce outage times and occurrences wherever possible.

We understand that without the support of you our members — the cooperative would not exist. We look forward to making 2022 another successful year of service and thank you for your membership and continued trust in North Central Electric.

SEEING THE ooperative DIFFERENCE

NCE may have a small membership compared to investor-owned utilities, but our impact on the local communities is huge. In 2021 alone, the co-op gave more than \$72,000 back to our members through the NCE People Fund, matching grants in partnership with CoBank, and college scholarships.

The co-op also helped launch the first Seneca CEO program in Ohio this past fall — a program that encourages high school seniors to embrace leadership and entrepreneurship as they shadow local businesses. Six students spent time not only at NCE, but at numerous local businesses within the area and are working together to traverse reallife learning experiences.

NCE remained active in legislative matters on behalf of our members, hosting the first in-person ACRE Co-op Owners for Political Action meeting since 2019. In candid conversations with local and state legislators, our members were able to share their concerns and opinions on energy policy decisions affecting rural America — quite literally their own backyard — with the support of their co-op behind them.

NCE also assisted other cooperatives, both in Ohio and other parts of the country, that faced large-scale system outages following storms. Even though we're locally owned and operated, part of the co-op difference is providing aid to other cooperatives and their members when called upon. Our linemen meet these challenges head-on and serve as great representatives of our local communities.

Perhaps most importantly, the co-op continued helping our commercial and residential members through rebates and incentives to increase their energy efficiency to lower monthly electric bills. As your electric co-op, we strive to be your trusted source for information ranging from electrical safety and reliability to solar realities in northern Ohio.

The cooperative difference is our foundation, and it is supported and maintained by the same communities that helped build the cooperative 86 years ago.

















The NCE board of trustees approved to return

in 2021 to our members, applied to December bills or provided to former members via check.


The cooperative retains annual margins to provide working capital for new construction, equipment, and system improvements throughout our service area. If NCE's revenues exceed expenses for the year, the excess allocates back to the members in the form of capital credits.

The amount credited to members is determined by how much electricity a member purchases during the year and the rate at which the member is billed.

2022 VIRTUAL ANNUAL MEETING OF MEMBERS

In accordance with the regulations of North Central Electric Cooperative, the board of trustees hereby gives notice that the cooperative will hold its 86th Annual Meeting of Members on June 14, 2022, at 6 p.m. via Zoom.

Members are encouraged to participate in this year's annual meeting through one of two options:

1) viewing the annual meeting livestream through their computer, tablet, or smartphone using the link provided after registration; or 2) calling a specially designated phone number to listen in via the audio-only option.

Registration for the annual meeting is available now on the cooperative's website, and all registered members who attend the meeting will receive a \$25 bill credit. Only one credit will be given per member account. It's important to remember that if your registration does not match your login information, there could be a delay in receiving your bill credit after the annual meeting. Further instructions on how to register for and attend the annual meeting, as well as a meeting agenda, are available on page 20H of this annual report.

Along with receiving updates on the current happenings at the cooperative, NCE will also announce the winner of the District 7 election and welcome a new trustee onto the board. The District 7 seat was previously held by longtime trustee and

board president Duane Frankart, who retired at the end of 2021.

This will be the third annual meeting NCE has held virtually, a change made due to concerns over COVID-19. However, the positive response and increased attendance numbers have encouraged the board to continue this format to include the largest number of members possible.

All registered members who attend the annual meeting on June 14 will receive a \$25 bill credit.

The annual meeting, and our members' participation in it, is part of what makes the cooperative different. We hope to see another large turnout at this year's meeting and encourage questions for the general manager and board president either prior to or during the meeting.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES NOMINATIONS

North Central Electric Cooperative members are poised to welcome a new trustee to the board at this year's annual meeting following the completion of the first contested election since 2018.

In February, Andrew Brose, Melissa "Lisa" Guzman, and Kevin Kreais all submitted valid petitions to run for the vacant District 7 seat, leading to a run-off election.

This election was held in March within District 7 between all three candidates to determine which two candidates would move on to the all-member election in May.

Following this run-off election, Brose and Kreais were named the final candidates for their district's seat and were placed on a ballot mailed to all NCE members within the territory. Voting opened on May 10, and the election closed on May 31.

Rodney Snavely, representing District 4, and Michael Scherger, representing District 6, remained unopposed in their districts. In accordance with NCE's Code of Regulations, because there was no challenger in either of these district races, both candidates are automatically deemed elected to the board of trustees, with new terms starting this month.

The winner of the District 7 election, along with Snavely and Scherger, will officially be announced as trustees, starting their new terms during the broadcasted annual meeting.

The regular annual meeting of the members of North Central Electric Cooperative, Inc. was held virtually using the live stream platform on the cooperative website due to Covid 19 at 6:00 p.m. on the 8th day of June, 2021 in accordance with the provisions of Section 1 of Articles III of the Code of Regulations of the Cooperative.

The invocation was given by Director of Communications Justis Clifford.

The meeting was called to order by Duane Frankart, President of the Cooperative, who presided. Val Darling, Assistant Secretary, kept the minutes thereof.

President Frankart reported that members registered for the meeting with 428 members being present virtually and that a list of those members present shall be annexed to these minutes. He then advised the members that in accordance with the provisions of Section 4 of Articles III of the Code of Regulations of North Central Electric Cooperative, Inc., those members present constitute a quorum of the members of the Cooperative and that the meeting was ready to proceed with business. The President directed the Secretary to annex the Certificate of Members to the minutes of this meeting.

A true copy of the notice of the meeting, together with the proof of the due mailing thereof to all members of the Cooperative, was directed by the President to be annexed to the minutes of the meeting.

The minutes of the 2020 Annual meeting of the members of North Central Electric Cooperative, Inc. were approved without being read, upon motion made by Teri Lease, and seconded by Theresa Scherger and carried.

President Frankart introduced the current Board of Trustees.

The meeting then was turned over to the Cooperative's legal counsel Attorney Brent T. Howard of Supance & Howard to report on the election of trustees. Attorney Howard explained that the three races for trustees were uncontested with each candidate from Districts 1, 2, and 5 being the only persons who submitted nominating petitions bearing at least twenty-five signatures of members from their district. He reported that in accordance with the code of regulations, no election was required or conducted and the three candidates, David Green of District 1, Steve Seitz of District 2, and Ron Frisch of District 5, were deemed elected.

President Frankart gave a report on some of the challenges that the Covid 19 situation created.

President Frankart introduced NCE People Fund Board members and encouraged all members to join ACRE.

President Frankart introduced General Manager Ed VanHoose, General Manager VanHoose recognized the scholarship winners and reviewed the youth programs available. He also reported on the broadband status. All members interested in solar were encouraged to contact the NCE office when considering the installation of any panels at their homes. He stated that we want our members to be informed regarding the pros and cons of solar installation.

Subsequently, there was a question and answer session between the membership and the President and General Manager.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, President Frankart declared the meeting adjourned at 6:41 p.m.

April 2022 Board Meeting Highlights

Call to order

Meeting was called to order at 6:04 p.m.

Attendance

All trustees were present as well as legal counsel, general manager, and senior staff (minus one). Rodney Snavely and David Green attended virtually due to COVID and work-related issues, respectively. Financial auditing company representative Earl Ridlen was also present to deliver the annual audit report.

Audit presentation

Earl Ridlen presented the NCE 2021 Audit Report to the board. It was reported to be a very clean audit. He commended the accounting department for all their work.

Approval of the consent agenda

Approved consent agenda consisting of prior meeting minutes, new members, collection report, delinquent graph, deceased estates, and outage reports.

Action items

- NCE and OEC safety reports reviewed and approved.
- Work order inventories totaling \$782,495.69 and special equipment summaries totaling \$80,895.49 approved as presented.
- NCE capital credit allocations approved as presented.
- Administrative Policy AP 201 as amended, "adding trustee to be able to cancel also" (regarding travel arrangements), Administrative Policy AP 203, Personnel Policy No 200.10, and Personnel Policy PP 305 approved.

 NCE voting delegate appointed for the CFC, CRC, and NCSC annual meetings.

Departmental reports

- Monthly financial reports, weekly reports reviewed with the board.
- GM VanHoose reported on the projected increases that will be coming from Buckeye Power. Also reported on the Hubbell March 2022 business report (manufacturer of electric materials). Freight costs and long lead times on materials are projected to become higher and longer than even previously incurred. Reviewed progress report on strategic priority #1.
- Operations, IT, communications, key accounts/ economic development presented monthly reports. NCE employee appreciation luncheon will be next week, and board members are welcome to attend.
- Administrative Policy AP 200, Organizational Policy OP 109, Organizational Policy OP 112, and Federated Annual Safety & Loss Prevention Assessment report reviewed with no recommended changes at this time.
- Reported that Our Solar II will be constructed in the Hancock-Wood territory.

Legal

The March NRECA Legal Reporting Service Bulletins was reviewed with the board. Attorney reported review of Code of Regulations underway.

Reviewed the Buckeye Power/OEC President's report.
